California special districts Association had an attorney as representative for the districts at the investigation on August 25. Is a lengthy but excellent document if anyone is interested in receiving a copy, I will certainly make one for you.

The investigation is not over. We are cooperating with special districts to answer any questions.

About the Commission

The Little Hoover Commission, formally known as the Milton Marks "Little Hoover" Commission on California State Government Organization and Economy, is an independent state oversight agency that was created in 1962. The Commission's mission is to investigate state government operations and – through reports, recommendations and legislative proposals – promote efficiency, economy and improved service. The Commission's creation and membership, purpose and duties and powers are enumerated in statute.

By statute, the Commission is a balanced bipartisan board composed of five citizen members appointed by the Governor, four citizen members appointed by the Legislature, two Senators and two Assembly members.

The full <u>Commission</u> selects study topics that come to its attention from citizens, legislators and other sources. In addition, it has a statutory obligation to review and make recommendations on proposed government reorganization plans.

The Commission's role differs in three distinct ways from other state and private-sector bodies that analyze state programs:

- Unlike fiscal or performance audits, the Commission's studies look beyond whether programs comply with existing requirements, instead exploring how programs could and should function in today's world.
- The Commission produces in-depth, well-documented reports that serve as a factual basis for crafting effective reform legislation.

Based on its reports, the Commission follows through with legislation to

implement its recommendations, building coalitions, testifying at hearings

and providing technical support to policy makers.

Under the direction of a subcommittee of Commissioners, staff conducts research by

bringing key players together for discussions, contacting experts, reviewing academic

literature and interviewing those most closely affected by the targeted topic.

Based on preliminary research, the subcommittee identifies key issues and oversees

the creation of public hearings to explore all sides of the issues in an open setting. The

public hearings serve to inform the Commissioners and educate the legislators, the

public and the media about the problem areas. The subcommittee develops findings

and recommendations that focus on the key issues and forwards a draft report to the full

Commission for its consideration. The Commission, as a whole, may make changes

before adopting and releasing the final report.

The Commission works to implement its recommendations either through legislation or

administrative changes. New hearings are held and progress reports are issued in the

years following the initial report until the Commission's recommendations have been

enacted or its concerns have been addressed.

Description of Study : 1-leal theare Districts

The Little Hoover Commission is reviewing California's vast network of local governing agencies known as special districts. State government has oversight responsibilities for the formation of new districts and the operations of more than 4,500 existing local and regional districts which operate airports, harbors, cemeteries, hospitals, libraries and parks, while also providing fire-fighting and paramedic services, flood control and water delivery throughout California.

The Commission previously studied special districts in 1999 and issued a 2000 report titled <u>Special Districts: Relics of the Past or Resources for the Future?</u> The Commission's recommendations included empowering Local Agency Formation Commissions to help consolidate districts, finding ways to make special districts more transparent and accountable to the public, requiring more prudent management of their considerable financial reserves and making it tougher for special districts to simultaneously collect fees and property taxes.

The State Controller in 2014 counted 2,993 independent special districts in California run typically by elected or appointed boards with assistance of professional staffs. In 2014, these districts employed 143,180 people and paid approximately \$9.5 billion in salaries and benefits. The Controller also tallied 1,500 county-run dependent special districts, which included more than 800 county service areas, to provide fire protection, flood control, highway lighting, road maintenance and other services. The Controller reported that another 254 city-run dependent special districts provided similar specialized functions. Collectively, these districts have issued \$5.7 billion in debt since June 2015, according to the State Treasurer's office.

This proliferation of more than 4,500 limited-purpose special districts, created to provide specific services in rural and urban areas as the state grew in population and developed infrastructure during recent decades, makes special districts the most common form of

government in California. In contrast, 58 counties and 482 cities provide general-purpose government throughout the state.

While the strengths of special districts include their ability to provide specific, customized services and be responsive to local customers, their challenges include low civic visibility and limited oversight.

Here is what is happened at the District

Each year there USDA requests a year and report. We have sent the independent auditor's report which includes the financial statements for noncompliance and internal control the schedule of audit findings. These have been sent to the appropriate office of the USDA rural development.

USDA also requires report on our policy for meeting the needs of limited English proficiency persons. Executive Order 13166, improving access to services for persons with limited English proficiency requires that each and entities that has borrowed money USDA proves that it complies to the law. I am in the process of collecting information from each of our renters how to comply to the law. This will go into my report to USDA.

Below is an example of important accomplishments that are achieved through partnership with California Special District's Association.

Last night, the California State Senate adjourned for the year without taking action on AB 2835 (Cooper). As a result, the legislation that would have given public employee unions with 30 minutes to provide orientations to new employees, on paid time, has died. CSDA partnered with the League of California Cities, the California State Association of Counties and numerous other public agency associations in opposing and Successfully stopping the bill that would have cost our agencies, and ultimately tax payers, hundreds of millions of dollar annually. —

Next Steps on Little Hoover Commission Hearing September 2nd, 2016 | Tags: Advocacy, Little Hoover Commission, Transparency | In the wake of its August 25, 2016, hearing on California special districts and follow-up to its 2000 report Special Districts: Relics of the Past or Resources for the Future? the Little Hoover Commission (Commission) plans the following next steps: A Thursday, October 27, 2016, hearing will explore how special districts are incorporating climate change adaptation into current and long-term allocations of their property taxes, fee revenues, and reserves. This decision results from Commission discussions with witnesses and through providing public comment about the climate change adaptation considerations for long-term investments and how to engage the public on the issue. The Commission previously studied state government strategies for climate change adaptation in its July 24 report Governing California Through Climate Change. The Commission has scheduled a two-hour advisory committee meeting following the October hearing. This meeting will take place Wednesday, November 16 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. and it will further explore the landscape of healthcare districts; particularly those without hospitals that have received attention from local grand juries, the legislature, and others. The Commission will invite more than a dozen experts from districts, associations, and elsewhere to a roundtable discussion in the Lower Level Conference Room at 925 L Street to present all dimension of the issue.
